Our Air and How to Keep it Clean



There is one thing that everyone who lives and visits Maricopa County has in common. We all breathe air. The average adult takes about 15 breaths per minute, inhaling nearly two gallons of air. With 21,600 breaths per day that equals 2.880 gallons of air each day.



The Effects

What are the effects of air pollution? Maricopa County and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency have designated six criteria pollutants, but particulate matter (PM) and ozone are the Valley's toughest to battle. Learn More ≥

Voluntary Vehicle Repair Program

- Administered by ADEQ
- Financial assistance for repairs after a failed emissions test:
 - \$550 gas vehicles
 - \$1,000 heavy duty vehicles
- 2008 or older to qualify
- Use an approved repair facility
- Vehicle owner pays \$150 co-pay
- Since 2018, more than 2,700
 vehicles repaired, saving owners
 more than \$1.3 million, and
 preventing more than 560 tons of
 emissions.





- Some species of trees emit large amounts of VOCs contribute to ground level ozone

 - Non-invasive
 - Low to moderate water usage

Maricopa County Propane Fire Pit Program

- County residents receive \$75 voucher for outdoor propane fire pit
- Partner with Home Depot and Az Propane
 Gas Association \$25,000
- More than 4,000 fire pits to date
- This past season ran from October through end of February



- Similar to Heat Advisory Program
- Sends HPA and specific action guidance to schools and childcare facilities on HPA forecasted days




